

GRASS SEED PROBLEMS

Long grass and seed heads can cause problems in all species. Think about grass seeds when animals develop cloudy, weeping eyes and take action immediately as corneal ulceration and damage can rapidly occur and be very serious.

<u>Ears</u> are another area that grass seeds end up affecting. The normal signs of this problem are head shaking, head tilts and ear discharges.



Awned seeds (especially barley grass) can be a real problem <u>penetrating the skin through hair or fur</u>. This is especially common in hairy toed / eared dogs so keep these areas clipped short to help prevent penetration. Signs of penetration are pain and discomfort in the affected area and tissue swelling.

These problems are much simpler and less expensive to sort out at an early stage so if you suspect a grass seed problem contact the clinic ASAP.



A GOOD START TO THE YEAR??

2022 is off to a pretty good start on most farms. Rain in late December has really set things up feed wise for January. Although the conditions have been rather challenging for crops on heavy, less free draining country!!

Grass growth in the last couple of weeks has been explosive and most pastures have a good clover content so lambs etc should do well and cows hold production. This might not be the case in February as feed quality declines rapidly!! Most clients are reporting that pre Christmas, lambs have done nowhere near as well as last year, and dairy farmers have commented that milk volumes are declining.

Warm, wet conditions will bring their own set of animal health challenges that need to be planned for. Facial Eczema may well become a significant threat. We are already getting reports of significant fly challenges on some properties. Worms, especially Barbers Pole, also thrives in warm, wet conditions.

If spore counts indicate a challenge is developing it is best to consider getting spore counts done from your property. Call the clinic if you are not familiar with what this involves.



BARBERS POLE (HAEMONCHUS) PREVENTION

As mentioned in the intro Barbers Pole can be a real threat to lambs and ewes (especially 2.2ths) in wet summers.

Using Moxidectin (the active in Cydectin / Exodus) still remains the best option on most properties to prevent and treat haemonchus.





Unfortunately on many properties, although moxidectin is still highly effective against barbers pole, it is not 100% effective against ostertagia and block scour worm (Trichostrongylus). This means it should NOT be used as a single active to drench lambs. Ideally use a combination drench such as Trimox containing Moxidectin.

We generally recommend barbers pole prevention programmes for lambs start in late January, early February. For ewes, faecal egg counts should be used to establish barbers pole burdens and threats before drenching.

COMPLETION OF CALF LEPTO VACCINATION PROGRAMMES

These programmes should generally have been completed by now. Early completion of calf programmes is necessary to prevent lepto becoming established in calves exposed to Leptospire bacteria at a young age.



PARVO CASES

In recent weeks we have treated farm pups for parvo virus. While parvo cases are now very rare, these cases highlight the fact that parvo virus remains a threat to dogs.


The parvo virus is extremely robust and can remain alive and infectious in the ground contaminated by scouring, infected dogs for years. Areas around pup pens are especially high risk.

Modern vaccines are extremely effective and do not necessarily require annual boosters. Some clients however prefer annual vaccination so things don't get forgotten!! Young dogs should still get 2 vaccinations from 6 weeks of age and a further booster vaccination 12 months later.



AGING COW PREGNANCIES
